SHAUN'S MUSINGS

ADDRESSING THE RULE OF THUMB

It may not be commonly known but most businesses use the rule of thumb of 100 sq.ft. to one employee ratio when designing an office space. This figure has only decreased as businesses look to ways to increase efficiencies in the workplace. Global multinationals are now working on numbers as low as 80 sq.ft./employee. This may very well be the future rule of thumb...

Acknowledging that we may not be able to arrest such global trends, we designed The MET to provide "relief" through the 3rd Spaces! Imagine an office building with a gym, breakout meeting spaces, outdoor workout areas, quiet/relaxing nooks and handpicked F&B to complement the ever demanding professional environment.

Despite these "escapes", each space allows for ongoing productivity with WiFi coverage provided throughout the 3rd spaces with a varying array of meeting settings to provide creative environments for ideas to percolate.

THE MET CORPORATE TOWERS

AN ARCHITECTURAL Q&A SESSION FEATURING

DESIGNING AN ICON:

1. In your own words, please describe who you are and what you do at The MET.

Shaun: My name is Shaun Mok and I'm the COO of Triterra. Being a small outfit the title is all-encompassing and this doesn't apply exclusively to me but to everyone in Triterra. We are ultimately a proactive, energetic and progressive group of individuals with a "can do" attitude.

Leong: I founded GSD Architect in 1995 and we are the architects of The MET Corporate Towers.

GSD has worked on different building projects such as the Majestic Hotel; both the new tower and conservation of the old Majestic. We have done the Menara Berkembar Bank Rakyat - a twin tower office building, the Tropicana Grande Condominiums, the Dorsett Serviced Residences and the 16 Quartz landed strata homes.

Architects are to facilitate the user's wishes, provide design guidance and to coax great spaces by exploring the evolution of an idea and working on the intangibles; of how the spaces, building and public realm are perceived and relate to each other. On The MET, we work on how the building may impact and contribute towards the urban character of Kuala Lumpur by working on these intangibles.

2. What was your inspiration behind the design of The MET Corporate Towers?

Shaun: Aesthetics only takes you so far. "Forward Thinking Functionality" with a splash of style was what inspired The MET. One must always remember that a building can outlive the lifetime of a human being. As such, timelessness and value creation were considered in designing The MET. No building design can be complete without the creative license of architects, which GSD delivered impeccably knowing our wants.

Leong: The idea is to create a better urban environment. I am interested with the idea of a forest city, of city living in a garden. My own house is smothered, cocooned in a garden forest, hence I call it Cocoon 17.

We started to re-green the urban spaces at The MET by creating gardens and planting trees. We even wedged in a small waterfall that flows out from the hillside which accentuates the forest feel of The MET. The building is conceptualised to rise from these gardens naturally as opposed to being dropped into the gardens. By creating these green pockets, we improve the urban environment, shaping liveable city spaces where we can eat, drink, work, play, rest or just linger.

With The MET, the green pockets are done at several levels, the first level is the street park that establishes the relationship between the building and the public. The second is the podium deck gardens that are 'private' community spaces for The MET. To connect these two garden spaces, at the appropriate places, the car park podium is randomly covered by planters that completes the green ambiance.

3. What were the challenges and considerations in coming up with the design and structure? What other factors influenced its design and construction?

Shaun: Once a good team of professional consultants are assembled, our "battle" was already half won! We have WEB structures, Valdun, GSD, JUBC, Praxcis and Fenestra onboard....these are some of the biggest names in town! With their collective input along with ours it wasn't that much of a "challenge" to come up with a product we were confident the market was ready for. We always wanted a timeless building!

The saying "penny wise, pound foolish" is one that I hold dear to and drives me and the team to think big picture and long term, which are important values in property development. The choice of materials, equipment and most importantly its quality are paramount in ensuring this development stands the test of time and creates value for our buyers and end users.

Economics must always be considered no doubt, however we aim to spare no loss to our esteemed owners giving them the very best the project can afford.

Leong: The site is very tight as it is constrained by several immovable structures on three sides. To the south is an existing public water supply reservoir, on a hill of course, to the south-east is a telecommunications tower and to the west is a high tension power line. The structures and hill demand that the existing surrounding contours are untouched.

Working with this, the building hugs into the hillside with minimal intervention of the contours with the internal service road climbing and descending around the building. We take advantage of this to turn the entrance driveway into a wooded hill drive, exploring the idea of an urban forest. The entrance lobby becomes visible only after cresting the sloped entrance drive that makes for a dramatic entrance experience and statement.

The MET is the first building to be encountered as you enter Jalan Dutamas 2. The MET is essentially the landmark building, the gateway to KL Metropolis. To do justice to this frontage, The MET is oriented towards Jalan Dutamas 2 with the higher main tower facing the street and the second smaller tower managing to squeeze a view east.

At street level, the building engages the public through a pedestrian plaza that will join with a planned pedestrian network in KL Metropolis. The pedestrian plaza is laid out with a food-court providing F&B outlets with al-fresco seating. This effectively turns the pedestrian plaza into a public space where people will gather and in the end, the walkway becomes a destination, an urban space.

4. Describe 3 special elements about The MET Corporate Towers that only a designer would know about.

Shaun: We keep our design innovations "simple" and there are numerous examples but the three I'd like to highlight are:

1. Lift numbers - "Time is money" so we have provided our users with a high number of high speed quality lifts with "hall call destination" technology along with security gantries.

2. Warm/Welcoming/Wow (3W's of the lobby) - The MET's lobby was designed to exude a sense of warmth, splendour and class; a little bit like a hotel. We spent countless hours on materials selection to ensure we obtained the exact look and feel. A high ceiling with beautiful stone and lighting was essential to achieve this.

3. The 3rd Space - We wanted to cater for an ever evolving work space environment. The line between a traditional cubicle/office space and outdoor areas is ever blurring. This brought about the concept of the 3rd space, which culminates in the Level podium where we have introduced elements we would with associate our own



homes such as showers, outdoor spaces, lounge rooms, pocket spaces and all the while knowing that if ever the need arises to get some "serious" work done, all the required amenities are at arms reach.

Leong: The MET is an ideas-led design initiative where we explore the idea of creating a green urban space as opposed to just putting up an ordinary office building.

1. The glass curtain wall façade is articulated as the architectural element that refines the form of the building and accentuates its height. The edges of the glass curtain wall are lit with LED lights that emphasise the form and boldness of the smooth glass wall. The glass wall carries the perspective upwards that expresses progressive dynamism and the avant-garde.

Glass curtain walls are utilised at the ground floor, showcasing the interior spaces to the public and establishing a visual relationship between the public and the building. The glass walls reflect the surrounding landscape that expands the apparent volume of the forest. The landscape is reflected, in essence borrowed, to project a virtual forest on the glass walls that wraps the users in a forest world.

2. The MET was designed to address and engage users, not just as a place of work but a place to relax and socialise. The pedestrian plaza with its adjoining food-court is a welcoming public space. Moving up to the ground floor lobby with its vast space and cafes is a social gathering space while up on the garden deck is a MET community space that engages users.

The towers are placed so that they may overlook onto the garden deck thus maintaining a visual connection between the offices and the community activities on the garden deck. The visual connection helps to strengthen the attachment to the place.

3. The office concept is envisioned as a centre for services, offices that relate to the knowledge-based businesses of modern trade. The office concept supports small

businesses and entrepreneurs, freelancers and the co-working environment. The offices are small and flexible so as to be able to flex and grow with the business. The offices are supported by a business centre at the garden deck that provides shared meeting rooms, board rooms, lounges and a modish function room.

5. Describe The MET in three words.

Shaun: Functional, timeless and surprising.

Leong: Urban Forest Icon.

6. What is the one thing that you would like people to know about The MET? What sort of legacy would people associate with The MET 50 years from now?

Shaun: Triterra's DNA courses through The MET. We set a target to create a new benchmark for strata offices to shake the market in a positive way by revolutionising the office space as we know it into the workplace of the future. Triterra's philosophy is to 'develop through the lens of their investors', delivering products that are ahead of the curve yet ensuring sustainable value creation.

Our legacy in Triterra/The MET will ultimately be fulfilled if these characteristics are felt, experienced and echoed by our investors.

Leong: The MET is an icon in KL Metropolis.

We wish for The MET to be known as part of a design initiative to redefine and reinterpret the relationship between the corporate workplace and the human factor that would lead to better working spaces or even introduces hybrid spaces such as the co-working environment. Finally, that The MET is part of the larger urban fabric of Kuala Lumpur and part of the life of its users. It is not an introverted, indifferent, aloof building.

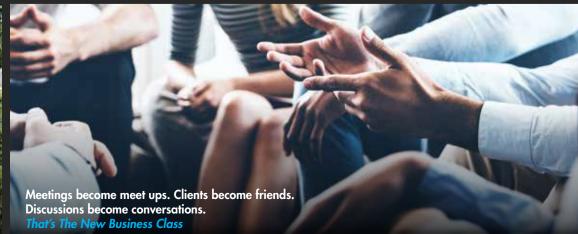
